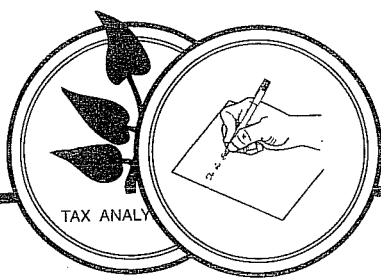

News Flash: The Income Tax Remains Constitutional

To the Editor:

No doubt many of you have been worried, because of questions raised by an erudite essay in this journal, about the continuing vitality of the Sixteenth Amendment.¹ You may now rest easy.² At the strokes of midnight on December 31, 1999,³ computers generally declared the new year to be 2000, not 1900. If it's 2000,

the Sixteenth Amendment has in fact been ratified.⁴ As a result, there is clear authority for an income tax that doesn't have to be apportioned among the states on the basis of population.⁵
