Message from the Editor

Ethical engagement and deep discourse on the pressing issues of the world is essential, if solutions are ever to be found for the seemingly intractable problems that plague humankind. Thankfully, there are many people all over the world, from a range of perspectives, who are willing and able to do this difficult work. These individuals inform, challenge, and guide us fearlessly, holding nothing back in pursuit of the truth.

One such global ethical leader was the recipient of the Inamori Center's 2023 Inamori Ethics Prize: advocate for the free press and Eastern European Bureau Chief for Voice of America, Myroslava Gongadze. After a long struggle against corruption, she succeeded in gaining justice for her husband, whose murder was orchestrated and covered up by the former government of Ukraine. She established herself as a trustworthy and intrepid journalist, and she has reported on the war in Ukraine since Russia's illegal invasion of her home country in 2022. In this issue, you will find a transcript of her Inamori Ethics Prize recipient's lecture, "Courage, Service, and the Pursuit of Truth" and also the transcript of an insightful conversation with Myroslava Gongadze, Dan Moulthrop, and Raymond Ku asking, "Are Free Speech, a Free Press, and Civic Discourse Essential to Human Flourishing?" for the Inamori Ethics Prize Academic Symposium.
