International Family Law: The Rights of Children

The Journal solicits articles on preselected themes within the broad area of international and comparative law. Themes for 1991-92 include the Middle East, International Business and Trade and International Human Rights Law. Unsolicited articles within the pre-selected themes and student contributions on any international or comparative law topic are welcomed. The article should be timely and provide more than just a summary of the current literature. Analysis should be thorough and original. Contributing authors are required to submit three copies of the manuscript. Unpublished manuscripts will not be returned to the author unless requested.

Articles should be concisely written, scholarly, and articulate. The introduction should contain a clear statement of the thesis. Descriptive material should be limited to the necessary background information. The body of the text should follow a logical progression to the conclusion. Use of direct quotations should be kept to a minimum.

All major points must be substantiated by reference to at least one authoritative source. Sources relied on should be recent and sufficient to indicate a thorough coverage of the topic. Overdependence on a few sources should be avoided.

Authors should cite only to authorities which they have personally consulted. All citations should be contained in the footnotes. Footnotes

may also elaborate on points raised in the text. Research sources which support points peripheral or contrary to those discussed in the text should be included and clearly noted.

Footnotes should conform to the Harvard UNIFORM SYSTEM OF CITATION, and should be up-to-date when submitted. THE GOVERN-MENT PRINTING OFFICE STYLE MANUAL should be consulted for matters of style not covered in the Harvard Citator. The Editor reserves the right to transfer some textual material to the footnotes or vice versa. Useful research sources discovered by the Editor may be inserted with the permission of the author.

Articles should be typed, triple-spaced with a two-inch left-hand margin. The text should be broken down into appropriate headings and subheadings. Footnotes should be numbered consecutively.
