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Foreword

The editors of the WESTERN RESERVE LAW REVIEW offer in this issue the second annual survey of significant developments in the law of Ohio reported during 1953. In a sincere effort to aid both the practitioner and the observer, we undertook in 1953 to survey significant developments in 1952. The modest success of our efforts and the expressions of appreciation of our readers, together with the lessons learned "the first time around" lead us to believe that it is worth the time and effort, and that a logical continuity in the growth of the law may in some measure be aided by a continuation of this work.

Following the pattern heretofore set, this survey has been written by members of the faculty of Western Reserve Law School and a skilled member of the Ohio Bar. The cases surveyed are those which appeared in *Northeastern Reporter, Second Series*, between January 1 and December 31, 1953.
