## EDITORS PREFACE

This issue of the Review presents a symposium of articles on subjects of current interest in the area of trade regulation. The contributing authors are prominent in the practice of antitrust and fair trade law. Thus, their analysis offers excellent insight into current problems in trade regulation.

The student note portion of this issue is composed primarily of a student survey of the Ohio law of trade regulation. The entire law of trade regulation is of increasing importance in Ohio, a state ranked high in the nation in industrial activity. Despite this fact, to the Editors knowledge, there never has been a comprehensive study of Ohio law in this area.

It was with the hope of establishing a framework for more coherent appraisal of Ohio trade regulation law that this student survey was undertaken. Frankly, trade regulation law in Ohio is a hodgepodge. It is hoped that this survey will furnish a springboard for study and recommendations to the legislature by bar associations and various interested groups.

This symposium issue is presented in co-operation with the Antitrust Law Committee of the Ohio State Bar Association. The Review wishes to thank its contributors and the Ohio State Bar Association for their support, and, in particular, expresses its gratitude to Myron N. Krotinger for providing the impetus for this symposium and for his suggestions in connection with the student symposium work.
